Engagement of girl students in various clubs gives them exposure and equips them to overcome various challenges in their daily lives and local, national, and global crises.


#### Women cell and awareness program for girls students:

- ➤ This College organizes lectures and memorizes the great devoted ladies for their exceptional contribution to motivating female students of the college.



# 2018-19 TP 2022-23








The above table and graph show clearly the strength of girls' student from different social categories during the academic year 2018-19 to 2022-23. It appears that the enrolment of each category in the assessment period is good, comprehensive and consistent. Among the reserved categories OBC is maximum followed by SC and ST. 






This data and graph shows boys participation in sports from 2018-19 to 2022-23. Participation was maximum at the College level but less at the University level.




The above data and graph shows girls participation in sports from 2018-19 to 2022-23. Participation was maximum at the College level than the University level.

#### Findings:

- Students' strength particularly girls' strength is increasing continuously
- Students of backward classes have bigger share in admission.
- Girl enrolment is more than that of boys
- Success rate of girl students is higher than boys.
- The participation of girls in cultural activities is higher than boys
- In sports the participation of boys is more than that of girls outside campus.
- Gender strength in regular teaching and non-teaching staff is lower than male

#### Conclusion:

After the survey, it has been found that in the case of enrolment of girl students are more than boys but in the case of staff, females are less. Active participation of female students and staff in policy-making bodies is significant in order to establish gender equality. However, there are some weaknesses in fewer sections which are to be overcome in the coming days. Till date there are no gender issues complaints. Many programs are conducted from time to time specifically for girls students to build up confidence. So it can be said that it is a gender-sensitive institution and with the support of all the stakeholders, gender balance can be sustained and would be healthier.

#### Suggestions:

- Will try to organize self-defense program on a regular basis.
- More awareness programs on Legal rights
- College intends to introduce entrepreneurship training in different subjects.
